RARE DISEASE DAY

Did you know that more than 400 million people around the world are affected by rare diseases? According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) a rare disease is defined as a condition that affects fewer than 200,000 people. There are more than 7,000 rare diseases that have been identified to date. Some examples of rare diseases include Huntington disease, Duchenne muscular dystrophy, Guillain-Barre syndrome, and fragile X syndrome. The CDC explains that one-way public health is involved in rare diseases is through newborn screenings. Newborns in the United States are screened at birth for over 30 selected metabolic and rare genetic conditions.

Rare Disease Day is observed on the last day of February every year. This year is extra special as it falls on February 29th, the rarest day of them all! The National Organization for Rare Disorders (NORD) encourages everyone to "Show Your Stripes" on February 29th to increase support and awareness for rare diseases. You are not alone in your fight.
